## Message from the CEO

Dear Stakeholders,

Protecting public health, safeguarding communities, and reducing environmental risk depend on stewardship systems that Canadians can trust. At the Health Products Stewardship Association (HPSA), those commitments define our role. As a trusted stewardship organization, HPSA works on behalf of pharmaceutical producers to ensure that health products used in Canadian homes are managed safely and responsibly at end of life—supporting both environmental protection and public safety.

In Manitoba, HPSA delivers this mandate through the Manitoba Medications Return Program (MMRP) and the Manitoba Sharps Collection Program (MSCP). We are committed to working with Manitoba Environment and Climate Change to ensure compliance and environmental stewardship in accordance with the Household Hazardous Material and Prescribed Material Stewardship Regulations (Man Reg. 16/2010).

2025 also marked HPSA 25<sup>th</sup> year as leader in extended producer responsibility (EPR) programs for health products and we continue to remain focused on delivering stewardship programs that are compliant, accessible, and efficient on behalf of **160** medications producers and **56** Medical sharps producers.

Collaboration with pharmacies, banners, and other health partners remains central to ensuring broad program reach across Manitoba's urban, rural, and remote communities. In 2025, our network expanded to **401** Collection locations, equaling a participation rate of **85.0%**. In 2025, HPSA collected and disposed **19,015 kilograms** of unwanted medications under the MMRP and **29,616 kilograms** of used medical sharps under the MSCP. HPSA could not have achieved those results without the collaborative efforts of our collection locations.

Public education and awareness remain critical drivers of behavior change. Consumer research shows encouraging progress in awareness levels reaching 80% for Manitobans, while reinforcing the importance of sustained education efforts to close the gap between knowing what to do and taking action.

As a stewardship organization, HPSA is committed to not just being compliant but also forward looking and outcomes focused. Innovation, collaboration, and continuous improvement remain essential to delivering effective, efficient and resilient stewardship systems.

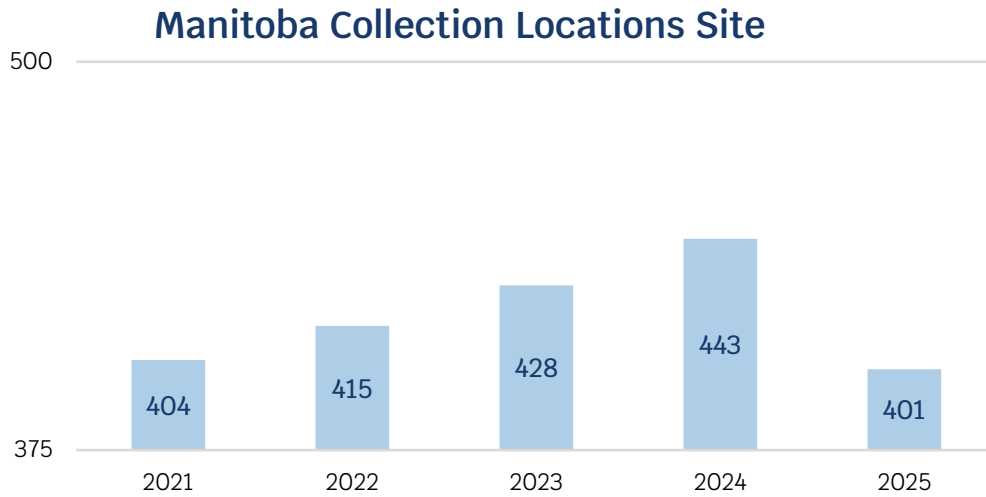

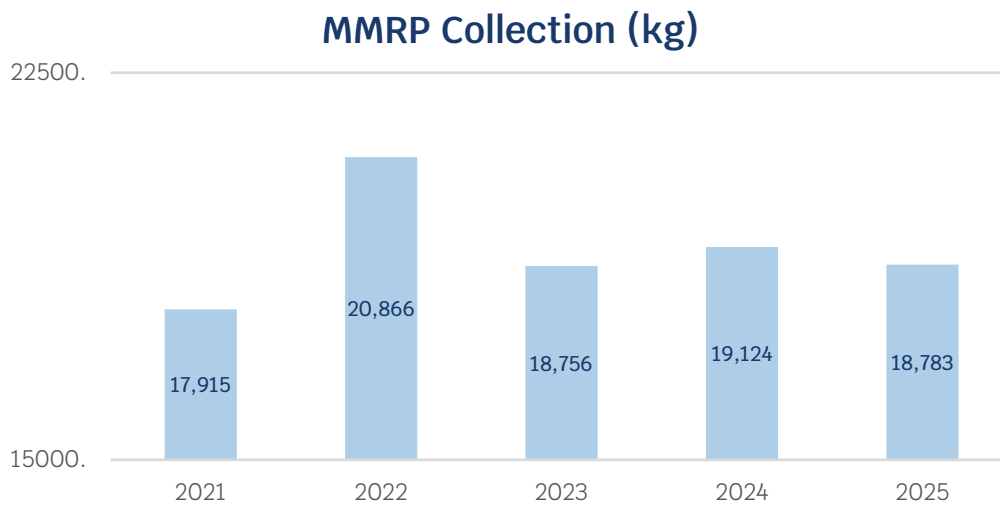

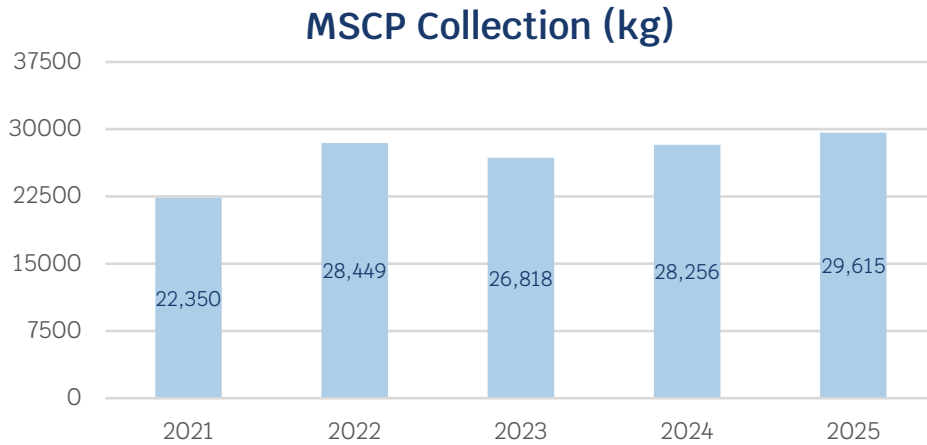
**Table 3 – MMRP Performance 2021-2025**

### Section III: HPSA Members

This report is submitted on behalf of the 160 industry stewards of Pharmaceutical products and **56 industry stewards** of Medical Sharp products that are members of the Health Products Stewardship Association (HPSA). HPSA's mandate is to perform, on behalf of each steward, certain duties required under the Waste Reduction and Prevention Act, and the Household Hazardous Material and Prescribed Material Stewardship Regulations (Man Reg. 16/2010) through stewardship program plans filed with Manitoba Environment and Climate Change.

The industry stewards are responsible for 100% of the costs of the Manitoba Medications Return Program (MMRP) and the Manitoba Sharps Collection Program (MSCP). HPSA is accountable to its members for the collection and responsible disposal of unwanted Pharmaceuticals and used Medical Sharps returned from the public through its network of registered pharmacies.

The list of stewards for MMRP is in **Appendix 1**. The list of stewards for MSCP is in **Appendix 2**.

## Section V: Accessibility

The letter of approval for HPSA's program plan stipulated that the program must:

*Provide information on current accessibility gaps, develop accessibility standards by 2025 to support reasonable access to program collection services by Manitobans and begin reporting on accessibility.*

To ensure that the Program provides "reasonable" consumer access to collection facilities, HPSA undertook a study of its accessibility in Manitoba. The GIS analysis of coverage for the Province of Manitoba was completed in January 2026 utilizing 2025 data to support the assessment of consumer access to collection locations (retail pharmacies participating in the HPSA network).

At the time of the study, 38% of collection locations were classified as rural and 62% of collection locations were classified as urban. The distinction between urban and rural was established using the following criteria:

## Section IV: Public Education Materials and Campaign

### 1. Provincial and National Campaigns

In 2025, HPSA developed and executed a range of nationwide and regional initiatives to boost program awareness, education, and engagement. This section highlights key campaigns from the year. Through earned outreach efforts, these campaigns secured more than 3.3 million impressions and reached more than 237,000 **individuals in Manitoba**.

#### Don't Dump Drugs

HPSA launched the Don't Dump Drugs campaign in Manitoba to promote the safe and environmentally responsible disposal of unused or expired medications and medical sharps. The campaign targeted adults aged 18 and older and used a multi-channel approach to build awareness across the province.

High-visibility placements were prioritized to reach Manitobans in their daily environments, including print, audio out-of-home, Spotify English audio ads and digital advertising across major urban centres. Print advertisements were placed in magazine and newspaper inserts distributed province wide.

Overall, the campaign generated more than 3.3 million impressions across media channels, helping increase public awareness and encouraging residents to dispose of medications and medical sharps responsibly.

#### Together for Safer Homes Campaign – Drug-Free Kids (now Substance)

HPSA supported the Together for Safer Homes campaign to raise awareness of youth substance use, promote harm reduction, and encourage the safe disposal of unused or expired medications across Canada.

The initiative included a six-week in-store radio campaign at Shoppers Drug Mart locations, a national webinar for parents on youth substance use and prevention, and community Take-Back Day activation events in partnership with Rexall pharmacies

#### HPSA 25th Anniversary

To mark HPSA's 25th anniversary, an integrated awareness campaign showcased the organization's leadership in the safe disposal of unwanted medications and used medical sharps. The campaign included digital advertising, national media outreach, a Take-Back Day with Pharmasave, a commemorative video, and tree plantings recognizing 40 long-standing collection locations that have been with HPSA since inception.

#### Ambassador Program

HPSA participated in MARRC's Ambassador Program alongside other PROs, taking part in 24 events and 12 parades. HPSA branded brochures and guidance on proper health products and medical

sharps return practices were distributed to attendees. The program also included radio and social media advertising across Winnipeg and surrounding rural communities, to increase public awareness of safe medication and medical sharps disposal and where these items can be returned.

## **Winter Road Program and Partnership with SpirtRx Services**

HPSA has collaborated with other PROs in Manitoba to support increased awareness in and collection of stewarded products from remote First Nations communities, many of which can only be accessed via seasonal winter roads.

HPSA also partners with Spirt Rx Service to provide MRP and SCP collection in 17 remote First Nations communities through their pharmacy division many of these communities are the same as those service by winter roads.

## **Social Media and Website**

In 2025, HPSA strengthened its digital presence to increase awareness of safe medication and sharps return programs. Paid digital advertising played a key role in expanding reach and promoting key initiatives, generating more than 6.7 million impressions.

HPSA's website recorded over 88,000 visits nationally, with more than 30,000 users searching for a collection location. To further improve accessibility, the website was enhanced with a new interactive geolocator map, making it easier for residents to find nearby return locations.

## **2. Educational Materials**

### **HPSA Consumer Survey 2025**

HPSA conducted consumer awareness studies in 2021, 2023, and 2025 to assess behaviors related to the safe disposal of medications and medical sharps. The 2025 results showed that 64% of Canadians correctly identified collection locations as the proper disposal method, with awareness rising to 81% among those aged 55 and older. In 2025, awareness of collection locations increased, with 62% of consumers knowing where to return used medical sharps and 49% knowing where to return unwanted medications, up from 57% and 47% respectively in 2023. In Manitoba, 52% of consumers knew where to return used medical sharps, and 44% knew where to return unwanted medications. These upward trends demonstrate the sustained impact of HPSA's outreach and education efforts, reflecting growing public understanding of safe disposal practices and reinforcing the effectiveness of continued awareness initiatives.

### **Pharmacy Student Perspectives on Medication and Sharps Take-Back Programs**

A survey of 105 pharmacy students affiliated with Canadian Association of Pharmacy Students and Interns (CAPSI) assessed their awareness and understanding of medication and medical sharps return programs based on their pharmacy internship experiences. Results showed that 52% of respondents were aware of take-back programs, while 78% strongly agreed that these programs are important for health and safety.

**Based on this, HPSA will continue to collaborate with CAPSI to further educate and engage future pharmacists, strengthening their understanding of medication and medical sharps return programs.**

## Educational Guides

HPSA enhanced its educational assets to ensure users can easily access vital resources and information. The updated guides now offer a more streamlined and informative layout, featuring direct links to educational videos, collection location maps, and other materials available on the HPSA website. These resources are designed to provide clear, step-by-step guidance on the safe disposal of medications and medical sharps, as well as other critical topics. The updates aim to improve consumer knowledge and foster greater participation in safe disposal practices. Please see **Appendix 4** for more samples of HPSA materials.

HPSA performed an accessibility study in 2025 where the provincial accessibility is 98%, with a rural pharmacy coverage of 95%, and an urban pharmacy coverage of 99.9%.

In 2025, a consumer awareness survey was conducted. In Manitoba, awareness of collection locations increased, with 62% of consumers knowing where to return used medical sharps and 49% knowing where to return unwanted medications, up from 57% and 47% respectively in 2023.

For the calculation method, the sample size for the survey was 874 for Manitoba and data from the Canadian Census, results were weighted according to age, gender, province and sharps incidence to ensure sample is fully representative.

HPSA also partners with Spirit Rx Services to provide collection of program products to 17 First Nations communities.

Feedback received through ongoing consultation indicates that Collectors have found the portal (a website created by HPSA where collectors can request information and access the latest updates) available over the past two years, to be an effective and user-friendly platform for requesting materials, with no issues raised. The program also continues to engage with Spirit Rx pharmacy to support pharmaceutical waste collection across 17 First Nations communities and continues to work closely with this collection location to understand and respond to its operational needs. No concerns were identified.

Although HPSA is below target, HPSA will prioritize increasing the pharmacy participation rate by leveraging an internal data review to identify inactive pharmacy members and drive their reactivation, given that the CPhM does not disclose the list of licensed pharmacies in Manitoba internal data must be used.

HPSA continues to expand equitable access to collection facilities and has a 98% provincial accessibility rate.

**Regional outreach and initiatives:**

- Don't Dump Drugs - This ongoing campaign educates on the environmental dangers of improper medication disposal.
- Participated in MARRC's Ambassador Program by distributing educational materials at events and parades.
- Collaborated with Drug Free Kids Canada (now Substance) in August during National Drug Drop-Off Month. Included radio ads, webinars, and media news publications and interviews.
- Social media channels - Through organic content and paid digital ads, grew to over 3 million impressions.

In 2025, HPSA conducted a consumer survey where awareness of collection locations increased, with 62% of consumers knowing where to return used medical sharps and 49% knowing where to return unwanted medications, up from 57% and 47% respectively in 2023.

In Manitoba, 52% of consumers knew where to return used medical sharps, and 44% knew where to return unwanted medications.

These upward trends demonstrate the sustained impact of HPSA's outreach and education efforts, reflecting growing public understanding of safe disposal practices and reinforcing the effectiveness of continued awareness initiatives.

The service provider contracted by HPSA (Stericycle, ULC) transports the waste to an HPSA-approved disposal site where pharmaceuticals and cytotoxic sharps were 100% incinerated and biomedical sharps were incinerated (67%) and landfilled (33%).

19. Describe any activities undertaken to demonstrate continuous improvement of the program.

HPSA has collaborated with other PROs in Manitoba to support recycling initiatives in remote First Nations communities, many of which can only be accessed via seasonal winter roads. This partnership reflects HPSA's dedication to enhancing program awareness and improving accessibility for all Manitobans.

HPSA continues to expand equitable access to collection services for First Nation communities by seeking to establish formal partnerships and enabling service delivery through identified pharmacy-based collection sites in Manitoba.

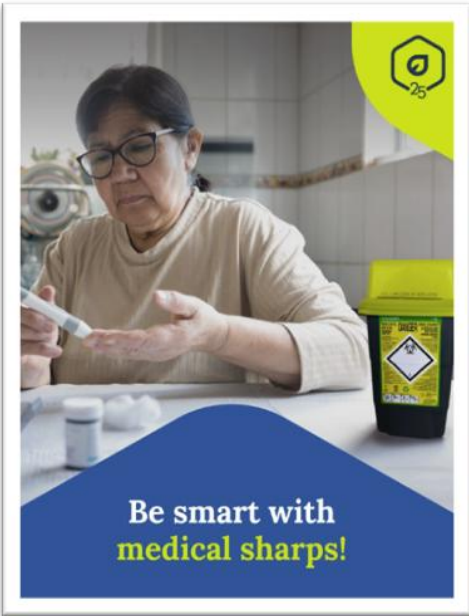
